MUST STAY:

Mama mia, the Four Seasons Hotel Firenze is lush with history! The 116-room property includes both the 15th-century Palazzo della Gherardesca and the 16th-century former convent, known as La Villa, which frames the

city's largest private garden. La Villa, the hotel-within-the-hotel, is where you'd want to stay. The residential atmosphere makes one feel at home with a private entrance, and it's only a 10-minute walk to the Duomo and other historical attractions.
